**Swearing In of Full Time Police Officer Nissi Robles-Lopez**

Police Chief Neil Dadian gave a background on Officer Robles-Lopez. He said he is an Army veteran and a current member of the National Guard. Officer Robles-Lopez was born in the central valley and has been a Reserve Police Officer since April 2015. He recently graduated from college at Brandman University. He is hardworking, honest, and dedicated to his chosen profession.

**Adult Use Marijuana Act; Proposition 64**

Police Chief Neil Dadian presented on the upcoming proposition on legalizing marijuana. He said money isn't worth the hassle for law enforcement. He said the danger to teens and kids are clear. Chief Dadian said our ordinance may be challenged at some point if it is successful in the November election.

Mayor Blayney said he strongly supports the resolution against the legalization of marijuana presented in draft form. Council unanimously approved bring back the resolution as final draft.

**6:00 P.M. KINGSBURG CITY COUNCIL AND PLANNING COMMISSION WORKSHOP**

**Call to order:** Mayor Blayney called the workshop to order at 6:05pm.

**Council Member present:** Creighton, Smith, Dix, Roman and Mayor Blayney.

**Commissioners present:** Cozbey, Kinney and Kruper (arrived at 6:06pm).

**City staff present:** City Manager Alex Henderson, City Attorney Michael Noland, City Engineer Dave Peters, Planning Consultant Holly Owen, and City Clerk Abigail Palsgaard.

**Public Comments:** None.

**Single Family Residential Development Process Workshop-** Presentations by City Manager Alex Henderson and Planning Consultant Holly Owen

City Manager Henderson said the City hasn't had applications for housing since 2005 and Staff thought it would be good to discuss the process and how everyone's role fits in together. He said he wanted to discuss the questions about where the public is able to be heard and the Planning Commission's role regarding the tentative map.

Planning Consultant Owen spoke about the timeline graphic explaining the process for building residential homes. She said one applicant has come in and staff has lots of comments regarding the project. Ms. Owen spoke about a larger picture and it is up to the City to say what it is going to look like. Plans for parks are important in the North Kingsburg Specific Plan (NKSP). She said site plan review is a back and forth with staff and the environmental documents, water, noise, variety of subjects that CEQA (the California Environmental Quality Act) says you need to address. After site plan review the project goes to the Planning Commission, City Council and then LAFCo (since it will need to be annexed in). The annexation will need to be approved by the Fresno County Board of Supervisors. When the CEQA is completed, there will be an opportunity for the public to comment on it. The Planning Commission and City Council will also be able to ask questions. Planning Consultant Owen said the door is not shut at city, if any individual has questions or concerns, we are available as staff. It is our job to be responsive to you.

City Manager Henderson said site plan review is a team of staff members that include the police department, fire department, SKF Sanitation, the City Engineer, Planning Consultant Owen and himself going over what is presented. He said traffic circulation is dictated by traffic studies, but alley ways and lot sizes is guided by the NKSP. He said it is a long process and at the end the staff will bring completed project.

Council Member Dix asked about sub-standard lot sizes. He said there are objective pieces and subjective pieces, and that is what we are trying to figure out.

City Manager Henderson said there are lots of questions about alley ways. If it comes to the Planning Commission it has to have mitigating factors, like how are the trash cans going to be hidden.

Planning Consultant Owen said any trade off of an amenity has to be justified by Staff, Site Plan Review and City Council.

Commissioner Cozbey asked what if they do comply with all the requirements.

City Manager Henderson said there are standards in place to protect the City and the developer. He would like to be a cohesive city.

Commissioner Cozbey asked how the Planning Commission's opinions are heard at the City Council level.

Mayor Blayney said the City Council is a judicial body, and we would have to research and rule accordingly.

City Manager Henderson said the Planning Commission needs to have a viable reason to deny the project.

City Attorney Michael Noland said environmental documents are based upon the initial study first done by Staff that has all the environmental issues CEQA lists. Staff reviews the studies provided from the developer. The developer could be required to do an environmental impact review. It is more subjective. If the NKSP says you have to satisfy these rules, and you do it, there is not a lot of subjective issues.

Mayor Blayney said let's talk through the Lennar subdivision and why it was non-controversial. It is non-controversial because they knew and followed the guideline. They did the environmental analysis the same time they did the site plan review. There was discussion at Planning Commission that they would like the lots on 18<sup>th</sup> as a larger size. Even though they met all requirements, the developer made those changes.

City Manager Henderson said the Planning Commission shouldn't feel like they must vote if they have a valid reason.

Commissioner Kruper said he wants to know what the concern is about the Planning Commission re-writing the map if past instances didn't go to court.

Mayor Blayney said it is up to the staff to make sure the plans are written correctly.

City Manager Henderson said you would be putting a developer in a position that even though they have been working with staff for a long period of time, and now the map is being questioned.

City Engineer Peters said at the tentative map stage a lot of engineering isn't worked out yet. Some issues were preferences.

Council Member Dix said Mayor Blayney's point is we want developers to feel comfortable working with staff, spent time and money, and shouldn't be surprised that the Planning Commission doesn't pass because they don't like something. We can't make it a gamble when it comes to the Planning Commission if they have done everything right.

Planning Consultant Owen said some of our standards will come up for review, and that is a good. Not just for future residential developments but existing ones too.

Commissioner Kruper said he agrees that developers don't want a surprise when they get to the Planning Commission with their tentative map. He said he would like to see open meetings on the maps. He said he is not interested in CEQA, as it is used by the public to stop developments. He said it is the design of the maps that is really important. Would like to see the Council and Planning Commission get involved with the PUD.

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Planning Consultant Owen said the City has suggested that developers have neighborhood meetings with potential neighbors.

Mayor Blayney said now is the time for us to go ahead and look at the items that are hot buttons. In our policy discussion, public outreach might be something that we should include.

Council Member Dix said it would be beneficial for developers to meet as a group to clarify what the City expects.

Commissioner Cozbey asked what the process is for updating the NKSP.

Council Member Dix asked if we can put together a standard to give to the developer. He said he would like to have a pro-active approach.

Commissioner Kruper said he would like a workshop with the maps so there will not be surprises at the tentative tract map Planning Commission meeting.

Planning Consultant Owen said they need to sell their ideas to the community, but we can't require it.

Council Member Dix said they could provide informal suggestions of subjective areas of the NKSP.

Mayor Blayney said we have to be careful with Brown Act if they all met regarding a subject that will be a public hearing.

City Attorney Noland said it is a quasi-judicial body for the Site Plan Review. You make decisions based on evidence brought forward at a public hearing and evidence that is on record. If the map comes up for a vote with the planning commission and commissioner votes no, we have a problem. A safer alternative is an individual coming to staff and letting them know what you are comfortable with.

Commissioner Kinney said if we add it to the form based code, we will not have to worry about it being reviewed.

City Manager Henderson said there are only a few issues that are subjective, like alley ways. But if there is some sort of consensus of what Council and the Planning Commission wants to see, I can present it to the developer. The NKSP is pretty spelled out with a fair amount of guidance.

City Attorney Noland said you can discuss issues now and at another workshop. You can go through it and direct staff based on what you would like to see.

Mayor Blayney suggested a public workshop for 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday in August (8/16/2016) at 6pm.

**RESOLUTION NO. 2016-047**  
**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL**  
**OF THE CITY OF KINGSBURG**

**OPPOSING THE ADULT USE OF MARIJUANA INITIATIVE – COMMERCIAL SALES  
OF NON-MEDICAL MARIJUANA BALLOT MEASURE**

WHEREAS, the Kingsburg City Council is committed to the success and positive future of our community youth, and to the health and safety of our citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Kingsburg City Council support efforts to decrease and prevent youth use of and exposure to marijuana and other drugs; and

WHEREAS, marijuana use can be harmful to the adolescent brain, affecting the parts of the brain that influence pleasure, memory, thinking, concentration, sensory and time perception, and coordinated movement; and

WHEREAS, a ballot measure titled the “Adult Use of Marijuana” to permit commercial sales of non-medical marijuana in California will be on the November 2016 General Election ballot, and

WHEREAS, analysis of the “Adult Use of Marijuana” initiative by the San Diego District Attorney’s Office points out, “The initiative allows persons convicted of dealing large amounts of controlled substances such as heroin (up to 20,000 individual doses), methamphetamine (up to 10,000 individual doses) to become legal marijuana dealers”; and

WHEREAS, the analysis further notes that the initiative permits convicted felony drug dealers who have used children to courier drugs to an adult buyer to be eligible to apply for a California marijuana license; and

WHEREAS, there are no provisions in the initiative to prevent advertising and marketing to children and teens near parks, community centers, child-focused businesses, and community colleges; and

WHEREAS, the HIDTA statistics for marijuana use in Colorado teens ages 12-17 are 74% above the national average; and

WHEREAS, the initiative allows for the indoor growing of up to six marijuana plants per residence and each plant requires 6 gallons of water per day in a state that is currently battling a drought; and

WHEREAS, in Colorado, where non-medical marijuana is legal and commercialized, marijuana-related traffic deaths increased 92% from 2010 to 2014 while all traffic deaths increased only 8 percent during the same time period; and

WHEREAS, a study released in May 2016 by AAA Foundation for Traffic Research found that fatal crashes involving drivers who recently used marijuana doubled in Washington after the state legalized the drug.

## EARTH DAY (MONTH!) 2016



## 2ND QUARTER COMMERCIAL SITE VISITS



## SWEDISH FESTIVAL



### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City Council has requested a review of our Municipal Code Chapter 6.04. Per your request, the City Attorney and I have worked to address some of the major issues and gaps in this chapter. The City is also working closely with the Fresno County Environmental Health Department and the Valley Animal Center to develop more proactive procedures related to animals in the City's care.

Some of the main points that were addressed are:

1. **Definitions** – Although this section is not new, there are new definitions that have been added. Definitions such as: Animal Control Officer, Bird, Breeder, Domesticated Animals, Fowl, Hearing Officer and so on. These definitions provide clarification and additional direction to certain sections of the chapter.
2. **6.04.020** – addition of section E: allows any animal to be lawfully removed if the owner refuses to have the dog vaccinated and licensed with the City. The owner will then have 5 days to redeem the animal and pay the fees, after the 5 days, the City takes control of the animal.
3. **6.04.040** – addition of sections E thru K: This section provides steps for animal bites and the requirements of the animal control officer, physicians, animal and owner – for release and information needed for release.
4. **6.04.050 – Redeeming of Impounded Animals:** this section used to be named – **Maintaining Other Animals**. This section reviews redeeming impounded animals. Included provisions on what the animal control officer will need to do when the animal has been impounded and provisions for release. As well as a rubric for redemption fees. The fees in this section will need to be reviewed and approved by Council so they can be included in the Mater Fee Resolution.
5. **6.04.060** – Introduction of **Duties of an Animal Control Officer:** this section provides direction on what the Animal Control Officer (ACO) would be responsible for. This section used to be labeled **Operating and licensing of kennels.**
6. **6.04.070 – Authority of Animal Control Officer:** This section introduces the ACO and what authority they have.
7. **6.04.080 – Animal Care:** terms and guidelines to which the City can classify “cruel acts”.
8. **6.04.090 – Limits on the Number of Dogs:** changing the limit from 4 to 5.

9. **6.04.110 – Excessive Noise, Nuisance:** providing guidelines for what is considered excessive noise and a nuisance.
10. **6.04.113 – Prohibited Animals:** this section has been expanded to provide clear guidance and direction of what kinds of animals are allowed within the City Limits.
11. **6.04.114 – Introduction of Breeders Permit:** provides guidelines on what a breeder can and cannot do. The introduction of a permitting process to be a breeder, and guidelines on what the permit will require.
12. **6.04.115 – Prohibition of Potentially Dangerous or Vicious Dogs**
13. **6.04.116 – Procedure to Determine if a Dog is Dangerous or Vicious:** To determine if a dog is dangerous or vicious, the Police Chief or his designee will provide notice to the owner within 5 days. If the owner would like a hearing they may do so within 10 days after the notice date. If the owner does not respond to the request, the City will take control of the animal.
14. **6.04.117 – Conduct of Hearing:** guidelines for the hearing, guidelines to determine if the dog is potentially dangerous or vicious.
15. **6.04.118 - Hearing Decision:** determinations that the hearing officer may make and the guidelines they may follow.
16. **6.04.119 –Disposition of a Potentially Dangerous or Viscous Dog.**
17. **6.04.120 – Procedure if Dog is Not Found Potentially Dangerous or Vicious:** If it has been determined that the dog is not dangerous or vicious, there are requirements the owner will need to take in order to keep their dogs. These steps will be imposed by the hearing officer.
18. **6.04.121 – Penalties for Dog Bites and Attacks:** This section provides penal and financial penalties to owners whose dogs attack another dog and/or human.
19. **6.04.122 – Penalties Generally:** Owners violating any of the provisions in the chapter will be guilty of an infraction and will have to pay the fees provided in the section.
20. **6.04.123 – Protection of Police Canine Units:** Rights and protections of Kingsburg Police K9's.
21. **6.04.124 – Public Events and Assembly:** The right for Council to allow or deny dogs at public events per resolution.
22. **6.04.125 - Mandatory Microchipping of Dogs and Cats:** requirement that all dogs and cats within the City limits be microchipped.

1. Review and direct staff to move forward with adaption of Chapter 6.04 of the Municipal Code.

### **PRIOR ACTION/REVIEW**

Previously the Council has discussed whether or not to allow chickens to be within City limits.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The City Council has discussed the possibility of allowing chickens within the City limits of Kingsburg. Although the Council decided not to move forward with that action, the discussion of the current animal control situation came up and how we can address some of the reoccurring issues.

Some of the issues include: animals running at large, dog bites and owners not complying with the City dog license and tag laws. Staff believes many of the issues regarding dogs at large are a matter of owner responsibility as opposed to a stray dog problem. Occurrences of dogs running at large can be addressed by a stricter fine schedule.

Mandatory microchipping will provide us with an additional tool to help us reunite dogs and owners. Although all dogs within the City are required to be licensed and to wear a tag, there are situations where their collar may get removed. The microchipping will still allow us to contact the owner.

Unless the particular provision or the context otherwise requires, the definitions and provisions contained in the following subsections of this section shall govern the construction, meaning and application of words and phrases used in this chapter; and except to the extent that a particular word or phrase is otherwise specifically defined herein, the definitions contained in Chapter 1.04 (commencing with Section 1.04.010) of Title 1 of this code, shall also govern the construction, meaning and application of words and phrases used in this chapter. The definition of each word or phrase shall constitute, to the extent applicable, the definition of each word or phrase which is derivative from it, or from which it is a derivative, as the case may be.

"Animal" means all species of the lower order of animals, including, but not limited to, dogs, cats and other pets.

"At large" means off the premises of the owner, and not under the control of the owner or a member of his/her immediate family by leash.

"Cat" means any feline, male or female, of the species felis catus over the age of four months.

"City" means the person in charge of the pound, or any officer or employee of the agency, society or organization operating the pound and who is acting under the general supervision of the person in charge thereof.

"Dog" means both male and female members of the species canis familiaris over the age of four months.

"Kennel" means any lot, building, structure, enclosure or premises where five or more animals more than four months of age are kept at the same time, or where any such animals are kept for the purpose of sale, breeding, or boarding.

"Leash" means any leash, rope, cord or chain or other physical connection or restraint not in excess of eight feet in length.

"Noisy dog" means any dog which habitually destroys the peace and quiet of any person or neighborhood by habitually barking, whining or howling.

"Officer" means and includes any police officer and any other officer or employee of the city, and any officer or employee of any agency, society or other organization with which the city may have a contract for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this chapter.

"Potentially dangerous dog" means any of the following:

1. Any dog which, when unprovoked, on two separate occasions within the prior thirty-six (36) month period, engages in any behavior that requires a defensive action by any person to prevent bodily injury when the person and the dog are off the property of the owner or keeper of the dog.
2. Any dog which, when unprovoked, bites a person causing a less severe injury than as defined in Section 31604.
3. Any dog which, when unprovoked, on two separate occasions within the prior thirty-six (36) month period, has killed, seriously bitten, inflicted injury, or otherwise caused injury attacking a domestic animal off the property of the owner

or keeper of the dog.

"Pound" means the place provided by the city for the impounding of animals, whether maintained directly by the city, or by an agency, society or other organization pursuant to an agreement or contract with the city, or provided by the city in conjunction with any other city or county.

"Private property" means all property not described in "public place" below.

"Public event" means any event or festival permitted by the city of Kingsburg that results in the gathering of people in areas closed to automobile traffic including, but not limited to, the Annual Kingsburg Car Show and the Annual Kingsburg Swedish Festival.

"Public place" means any park, public building, playground, street, road, alleyway, or any other place open to the general public.

"Seeing eye dog" means any dog trained to lead a blind person.

"Unlicensed dog" means any dog for which the city dog license for the current year has not been paid.

"Vaccination" or "vaccination against rabies" means the inoculation of a dog with a vaccine approved by the city or the United States Public Health Service for use in the prevention of rabies in dogs.

"Vicious dog" means any of the following: (As described in the Food and Agricultural Code Section 31603)

1. Any dog seized under Section 599aa of the Penal Code and upon the sustaining of a conviction of the owner or keeper under subdivision (a) of Section 597.5 of the Penal Code.
2. Any dog which, when unprovoked, in an aggressive manner, inflicts severe injury on or kills a human being.
3. Any dog previously determined to be and currently listed as a potentially dangerous dog which, after its owner or keeper has been notified of this determination, continues the behavior described in Section 31602 or is maintained in violation of Section 31641, 31642, or 31643.

#### 6.04.020 - Licenses generally.

- A. All dogs kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the city shall be licensed and registered, if over four months of age, and application shall be made within thirty (30) days of acquiring such dog. Dog licenses shall be issued by the city clerk upon payment of a license fee as set by council resolution. The owner shall state at the time application is made for such license, and upon forms provided for such purpose, his/her name and address, and the name, breed, color and sex of each dog owned or kept by him. Licenses shall be valid for the fiscal year July 1 to June 30, and shall be purchased annually. The provisions of this section shall not be intended to apply to dogs whose owners are nonresidents temporarily within the city, nor to dogs brought into the city for the purpose of participating in any dog show.
- B. Every person owning or maintaining a dog that has been specifically trained and certified as an aid to a person with a physical handicap shall be exempt from payment of license fees but still requires the license and vaccination certificate. Seeing eye dogs and other dogs trained to help the physically disabled shall receive a license at no charge.
- C. All dog licenses shall be issued for a period terminating on the thirtieth day of June of each year. A license, when issued prior to January 1 of any year, shall be charged and paid for at the full yearly rate; and when issued after the first day of January, only one-half of the yearly rate, and, if applicable, only one-half the additional penalty shall be charged if no license fee for such dog shall have been due or payable for such dog prior to such first day of January.

- D. No dog license shall be issued for any dog unless the owner or custodian shall present to the city clerk a certificate by a licensed veterinarian that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies within a period of eighteen (18) months prior thereto.

#### 6.04.030 - License tags.

Upon payment of the license fee set by resolution of the city, the clerk shall issue to the owner a license certificate and a metallic tag for each dog so licensed. The shape of the tag shall be changed every year and shall have stamped thereon the year for which it was issued and the number corresponding with the number on the certificate. Every owner shall be required to provide each dog with a collar to which the license tag must be affixed, and shall see that the collar and tag are constantly worn. In case a dog tag is lost or destroyed, a duplicate will be issued by the clerk upon presentation of a receipt showing the payment of the license fee for the current year, and the payment of a fee, as set by council resolution, for such duplicate. Dog tags shall not be transferable from one dog to another, and no refunds shall be made on any dog license fee because of death of the dog or the owner's leaving the city before expiration of the license period.

#### 6.04.040 - Rabies vaccination generally.

- A. Every person who keeps or harbors any dog or other animal requiring rabies vaccination shall have same vaccinated with an approved vaccine by a duly licensed veterinarian. Said vaccination against rabies shall commence with dogs over four months and all other animals as required by standards of veterinary medicine practices.
- B. Upon demand of any officer, every person keeping or harboring any animal that requires vaccination against rabies shall produce the certificate of vaccination for said animal.
- C. The officer shall impound any animal which has not been vaccinated as required by this section.
- D. Every person practicing veterinarian medicine in the city of Kingsburg who vaccinates dogs or other animals with rabies vaccine shall issue to the owner thereof a certificate signed by such veterinarian which states:
1. The name and address of the owner or harbinger of the vaccinated animal;
  2. The kind of vaccine used, the name of the manufacturer, the manufacturer's serial or lot number and the date of vaccine;
  3. The breed, age, color and sex of the vaccinated dog;
  4. Year and serial number of the license tag, if any.

#### 6.04.050 - Maintaining other animals.

- A. Every person owning, keeping or maintaining an exotic animal shall so maintain said animal that it does not constitute a threat of physical harm to persons, property or other animals or an annoyance to persons by loud noises or odors.
- B. As used herein "exotic animal" means any species of animal not normally kept as a domesticated household pet and includes, but is not limited to, snakes, wolves, lions, etc.
- C. Other domesticated animals shall not be kept in violation of applicable zoning regulations. "Domesticated animals" as used herein means livestock and poultry and similar animals.

## 6.04.060 - Operation and licensing of kennels.

- A. Every person owning or operating a kennel shall pay an annual license fee, as set by council resolution, for any such kennel, which fee shall be the kennel license fee for all animals kept therein. Such license fee shall be due and payable on and after the first day of July of each year and such license shall be for the period of one year commencing on the first day of July. Any owner or operator of a kennel failing to procure and pay for a kennel license until after the thirty-first day of July of any year shall pay an additional penalty as set by council resolution for such delinquency. The fee provided herein shall be in addition to any business license required in this code.
- B. All licensed kennels are to be so constructed as to prevent animals confined therein from running at large off the premises where such kennels are maintained. All kennels are to be operated and constructed in a sanitary and proper manner so that the same shall not become a nuisance to the neighborhood thereof.
- C. No kennel license shall be issued until the city has determined that the kennel is constructed and operated in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, the applicable zoning laws and has been constructed under a valid building permit of the city of Kingsburg. All kennels shall at all times be subject to the general supervision of the city.

## 6.04.070 - Redeeming impounded animals.

- A. The owner or person entitled to possession of any animal may at any time before the sale or disposition thereof redeem the same. Upon proof satisfactory to the city that such person is the owner or is entitled to receive such animal, upon payment of the redemption and maintenance charges as established by resolution, and upon obtaining a city dog license, if the dog is unlicensed and required to have such license, such animal shall be delivered to such person, together with a receipt for all fees so paid; which receipt shall contain a description of the animal redeemed, the date of redemption, the name and address of the redeemer, and a statement that such animal has been redeemed.
- B. Redemption fees and maintenance charges shall be set by council resolution and based upon the number of times an animal is impounded, as follows:
  1. First time within six months: Basic redemption fee.
  2. Second time within six months: Double the basic fee.
  3. Third time within six months: Triple the basic fee.
- C. The city is authorized at its discretion to hold for a period of ten (10) days any impounded dog in heat prior to redemption or sale.

## 6.04.080 - Disposition of unredeemed, unlicensed animals.

If any unlicensed animal or any dog bearing no license tag, is picked up and impounded under the provisions of this chapter and is not redeemed in the time period as prescribed by state law, the city at its discretion may at any time thereafter, humanely destroy or place the same for adoption without notice.

## 6.04.090 - Disposition of unredeemed, licensed dogs.

If any licensed dog, bearing a license tag, picked up or impounded under this chapter, is not redeemed within a period of time as prescribed by state law, the city at its discretion may at any time thereafter humanely destroy such dog or place it for adoption provided, that the city shall mail a notice of such impounded dog, within three days after such dog is impounded, in

a sealed envelope directed to the licensee at the address shown in the application on file in the office of the city clerk.

6.04.120 - Prohibited acts.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any owner of a dog, or any person having such dog, intentionally or otherwise to permit such dog to go upon, run at large upon, or stray upon any public place in the city of Kingsburg unless such dog is securely and continuously under the control of some responsible person capable of controlling such dog by a leash, or unless such dog is confined within a vehicle.
- B. It shall be unlawful for an owner of a dog or a person having custody of a dog intentionally or otherwise to allow such dog to go upon, run at large upon or stray upon private property within the city of Kingsburg without the permission of the person owning, occupying or controlling such property.
- C. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep upon any property within the city of Kingsburg under his/her ownership, occupation or control, other than in a duly licensed animal hospital, kennel or pet store, any dog or other animal, which by continuous barking, whining or other noise, unreasonably disturbs the peace, comfort or quiet of a person within the city of Kingsburg.
- D. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep upon any property under his/her ownership, occupation or control other than in a duly licensed animal hospital, kennel or pet store, more than a total of four animals as defined herein. Any animals in excess of said maximum shall be impounded as provided herein.
- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph A. of this Section 6.04.120 and subject to any and all rules and regulations issued by the city of Kingsburg regarding the use of a city of Kingsburg dog park, an owner of a dog and any person having such dog may allow such dog to go upon and run at large within that portion of the city of Kingsburg Laurel Street Ponding Basin specifically designated by the city of Kingsburg as a dog park area.
- F. Use of a city of Kingsburg dog park where dogs run at large and are not leashed and under the control of the dog owner or any other person having such dog represents a hazardous recreational activity to all persons using or present at a city of Kingsburg dog park. The city of Kingsburg will not be liable for injuries to any person participating in such hazardous recreational activity by use or presence at a city of Kingsburg dog park.

6.04.130 - Authority to impound.

Any officer may impound an animal as follows:

- A. Subject to the provisions of California Government Code, Section 53074, any unlicensed dog or dog bearing no license tag, or any dog running at large upon any public place, or any private place without the consent of the owner of such place.
- B. Any dog or cat that is being kept or maintained on property in violation of the maximum number allowed under this chapter.
- C. When any officer has reasonable cause to believe that any animal is diseased or dangerous to any person or other animal said animal may be impounded for such period of time as is required to observe, examine and determine whether such animal constitutes a menace to the public health or safety.

#### 6.04.140 - Complaints.

Any individual making a complaint to an officer with respect to the violation of regulations set forth in this chapter shall furnish his/her name, address and telephone number, and shall indicate a willingness to sign a complaint and to provide testimony as to the violations in an appropriate court should a court hearing be required following the issuance of a complaint.

#### 6.04.150 - Protection of police canine units.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully or maliciously torture, tease, torment, beat, kick, strike, mutilate, injure, disable or kill any dog used by the city of Kingsburg police department, or any other law enforcement agency while engaged in mutual aid assistance to this city, or the designated handlers of such animals, while any such dog is in the performance of the functions or duties of the police department or other law enforcement agency, or to willfully interfere with or obstruct any such dog while it is being used in the performance of any of the duties or functions of the department or other law enforcement agency.
- B. No provision of this section shall be constructed to prohibit any act made unlawful by any general law of the state of California, but said section is intended to be supplemental thereto.

#### 6.04.160 - Public events or assemblies.

The city council may, by resolution, prohibit dogs whether or not confined by leash, from attendance at any public event as that term is defined in Section 6.04.010 and any assembly as that term is defined in Section 12.16.010 of this code. The prohibition of dogs shall not apply to guide dogs and other service dogs to assist disabled persons attending the public event or assembly.

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**ORDINANCE NO. 2016-004**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KINGSBURG AMENDING, IN ITS ENTIRITY, CHAPTER  
6.04 OF TITLE 6 OF THE KINGSBURG MUNICIPAL CODE  
PERTAINING DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS**

The City Council of the City of Kingsburg does hereby ordain as follows:

**Section 1.** Chapter 6.04 of Title 6 of the Kingsburg Municipal Code is amended in its entirety as follows:

**6.04.010 Definitions.**

Unless the particular provision or the context otherwise requires, the definitions and provisions contained in the following subsections of this section shall govern the construction, meaning and application of the words and phrases used in this chapter 6.04; and except to the extent a particular word or phrase is otherwise specifically defined herein, the definitions contained in Chapter 1.04 of Title 1 of this code, shall also govern the construction, meaning and application of the words and phrases used in this chapter. The definition of each word or phrase shall constitute, to the extent applicable, the definition of each word or phrase which is derivative from it, or from which it is a derivative, as the case may be.

“Animal”: Any living vertebrate member of the animal kingdom.

“Animal Control Officer”: Unless otherwise designated by the State of California, City of Kingsburg, or Fresno County, the Chief of Police shall designate a police employee as the Animal Control Officer. In addition, all police officers of the city are required to perform the duties of the Animal Control Officer as may be required by the Chief of Police.

“At Large”: Means an animal off the premises of the person owning or having the possession, charge, custody, or control of the animal and not under the immediate control of a person by means of an enclosure, leash, rope, or other means of immediate effective physical control.

“Bird”: Any member of the bird family, including, but not limited to, parakeets, cockatiels, macaws, parrots, finches, conures and swans, domesticated to serve as a pet.

“Breeder”: Any person or entity which breeds two (2) or more litters of dogs in one year for sale or profit.

“Cat”: Any member of the feline family, male or female, domesticated to serve as a pet.

“Dog”: Any member of the canine family, male or female, domesticated to serve as a pet.

“Domesticated Animals”: Dogs, cats, small mammals, reptiles, amphibians and birds kept and maintained as household pets.

“Fowl”: Any chicken, duck, goose, turkey, guinea, pigeon, peacock or other fowl.

1 "Hearing Officer": The Chief of Police or any designee of the Chief of Police.

2 "Impoundment": Shall mean the taking up and confinement of any animal in the Pound  
3 or an animal shelter, veterinary hospital, or other facility.

4 "Litter": A litter means two (2) or more offspring from one or more female dogs or cats  
5 located at the same premises.

6 "Livestock": Any horse, pony, mule, burro, jack or jennie, cow, bull, calf, heifer, sheep,  
7 goat, swine, hog, pig, and all other domestic or domesticated animals other than household  
8 pets.

9 "Owner": Any individual, partnership, limited liability company, corporation or other entity  
10 owning, having an interest in, having custody or possession of, keeping or harboring one or  
11 more animals. An animal shall be deemed to be harbored if it is fed or sheltered for three (3)  
12 consecutive days or more.

13 "Person": Any individual, partnership, limited liability company, corporation or other  
14 entity.

15 "Potentially Dangerous Dog" means any of the following:

16 1. Any dog which, when unprovoked, on two separate occasions within any twelve (12)  
17 month period, engages in any behavior that requires a defensive action by any person to  
18 prevent bodily injury when the person and the dog are off the property of the owner or keeper of  
19 the dog.

20 2. Any dog which, when unprovoked, bites a person causing a less severe injury than  
21 as defined in Food and Agriculture Code Section 31604.

22 3. Any dog which, when unprovoked, on two separate occasions within any twelve (12)  
23 month period, has killed, seriously bitten, inflicted injury, or otherwise caused injury attacking a  
24 domestic animal off the property of the owner or keeper of the dog.

25 "Pound": Means the place provided by the city for the impounding of animals, whether  
26 maintained directly by the city, or person pursuant to an agreement or contract with the city or in  
27 conjunction with another city or county.

"Premises": Means a house, other dwelling, a yard or other area so enclosed as to  
prevent an animal from escaping.

"Private Property": Means all property not defined as a "public place".

"Public Event": Means any event or festival permitted by the city that results in the  
gathering of people in areas closed to vehicular traffic.

"Public Nuisance": Any animal which: (i) Molests an individual or chases passing  
vehicles; (ii) attacks an individual or other animals; (iii) trespasses on or damages private  
property, a public place or school grounds; (iv) s repeatedly at large; (v) barks, whines, or howls  
or makes any other noise that disturbs the comfort and quiet enjoyment of any person; (vi) a  
Potentially Dangerous Dog; (vii) a Vicious Dog.

1 "Public Place": Any park, public building, playground, street, road, alleyway, or other  
2 place open to the general public.

3 "Restraint": A leash not in excess of eight feet (8'), a tethered lead, or a fenced  
4 enclosure which keeps the animal under the control of a person or within the premises of the  
5 owner of the animal or the person who has possession, charge, custody or control of the  
6 animal.

7 "Unlicensed Dog": Means any dog for which the city dog license for the current year has  
8 not been paid.

9 "Vaccination" or "Vaccination Against Rabies" means the inoculation of a dog with a  
10 vaccine approved by the city or the United States Public Health Service for use in the  
11 prevention of rabies in dogs.

12 "Veterinary Hospital": Any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed  
13 veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injuries of animals.

14 "Vicious Dog": means any of the following:

15 1. Any dog seized under Section 599aa of the Penal Code and upon the  
16 sustaining of a conviction of the owner or keeper under subdivision (a) of Section 597.5 of the  
17 Penal Code.

18 2. Any dog which, when unprovoked, in an aggressive manner, inflicts severe  
19 injury on or kills a human being.

20 3. Any dog previously determined to be and currently listed as a potentially  
21 dangerous dog which, after its owner or keeper has been notified of this determination,  
22 continues such behavior.

#### 23 **6.04.020 - Licenses Generally.**

24 A. All dogs over four (4) months of age, kept, harbored or maintained by their  
25 owners in the city shall be licensed and registered. Within thirty (30) days after acquiring a dog,  
26 the owner of the dog must file: (i) an application for licensing and registration with the city clerk  
27 together with a vaccination certificate, as required by Section 6.04.040 of this chapter; (ii) proof  
the dog has been microchipped as required by Section 6.04.125 of this chapter; and payment  
of a license fee as set by city council resolution. Licenses shall be valid for the fiscal year July 1  
to June 30, and shall be purchased annually. The provisions of this section are not intended to  
apply to dogs whose owners are nonresidents temporarily within the city or to dogs brought into  
the city for the purpose of participating in any dog show.

B. Every person owning or keeping a dog that has been specifically trained and  
certified as an aid to a person with a physical or mental disability, including, without limitation,  
seeing eye dogs, must be licensed and registered, obtain a vaccination certificate and must be  
microchipped but shall be exempt from payment of license fees.

C. All dog licenses shall be issued for a period terminating on the thirtieth (30th) day  
of June of each year. For a license issued prior to January 1 of any year, a full year license fee

1 shall be paid. For a license issued after the first day of January of any year, only one-half of the  
2 annual license fee shall be paid. Any penalty payments associated with dog licenses shall be  
paid in the same fashion as the dog license fee.

3 D. No dog license shall be issued for any dog unless the owner of the dog shall  
4 present to the city clerk a certificate by a licensed veterinarian (vaccination certificate) that the  
dog has been vaccinated in accordance with Section 6.04.040.

5 E. Any dog which is unlicensed or which the license fee is unpaid, or upon which  
6 the owner refuses to obtain a license or pay the license fee, or refuses to have the dog  
7 vaccinated and microchipped as required by this chapter, may be lawfully taken up and  
8 impounded by an animal control officer and it shall be lawful for an animal control officer to  
9 enter upon the property of any person for the purpose of taking up and impounding the dog.  
10 Any dog taken up and impounded as provided herein shall be held at the pound for ten (10)  
11 days. If the requirements of this Section are not met within said ten (10) days, the animal  
12 control officer shall cause the dog to be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of  
13 subsections F and G of Section 6.04.050. In addition to payment of license fees, the owner  
14 shall also pay redemption and impoundment fees.

standards of veterinary medicine practices. Dogs and cats shall be re-vaccinated one (1) year  
after the Initial Vaccination and at least every three (3) years thereafter.

24 B. Upon demand of any animal control officer, every person keeping or harboring  
25 any animal that requires vaccination against rabies shall produce a current certificate of  
vaccination for said animal.

26 C. The animal control officer shall impound any animal which has not been  
27 vaccinated as required by this section.

1 D. Every person practicing veterinarian medicine in the city who vaccinates dogs or  
2 other animals with rabies vaccine shall issue to the owner thereof a certificate signed by such  
3 veterinarian which states:

- 4 1. The name and address of the owner of the vaccinated animal;
- 5 2. The kind of vaccine used, the name of the manufacturer, the  
6 manufacturer's serial or lot number and the date of vaccine;
- 7 3. The breed, age, color and sex of the vaccinated dog;
- 8 4. Year and number of the license tag of the vaccinated dog.

9 E. The animal control officer shall take up and place in isolation any dog, cat or  
10 other animal which in the opinion of the owner of the animal, a licensed veterinarian or the  
11 animal control officer displays symptoms suggestive of rabies. Such isolation shall be at the  
12 pound unless the owner of the dog or cat, with the approval of the animal control officer,  
13 arranges with a licensed veterinarian for such isolation in a private animal hospital or clinic. Any  
14 dog or cat placed in such isolation shall be kept strictly confined and under such observation as  
15 may be required by the animal control officer. Isolation shall continue for at least ten (10) days  
16 from the date the symptoms suggestive of rabies were first observed. The isolation may be  
17 continued for a period longer than ten (10) days if, in the opinion of any licensed veterinarian or  
18 the animal control officer, a longer period is necessary. At the expiration of the isolation period,  
19 any dog or cat confined at the pound shall be released upon payment of the fees set by  
20 resolution of the city council.

21 F. It shall be the duty of every licensed veterinarian in the city to report immediately  
22 to the animal control officer any animal observed by him/her as having rabies or is suspected of  
23 having rabies.

24 G. It shall be the duty of every physician, or other person, to report to the animal  
25 control officer the name and address of any person treated for a bite inflicted by an animal of a  
26 species subject to rabies infections, and any other information as required by the animal control  
27 officer.

28 H. The animal control officer shall take up, impound, and isolate for at least ten (10)  
29 days following the date of the alleged bite, any animal of a type subject to rabies that is  
30 reported to have bitten any person, whether or not such animal displays any symptoms  
31 suggestive of rabies. The animal shall be impounded and isolated in the manner provided in  
32 Subsection E above.

33 I. Any person who is 18 years of age or older may, however, make written request  
34 to the animal control officer for the isolation of such biting animal either in facilities provided by  
35 a licensed veterinarian or in a licensed boarding kennel or upon the private premises of the  
36 person making such request. If such request is approved by the animal control officer, such  
37 biting animal shall not be taken up and impounded but shall instead be kept strictly confined  
38 and isolated in such veterinarian's facilities or on such private premises for the isolation period.

39 J. Every person who, after requesting and obtaining approval for the keeping of a  
40 biting animal confined and isolated upon his/her private premises, fails for any reason  
41 whatsoever to keep such animal continuously confined and isolated upon his/her premises,

1 either indoors or inside an enclosure, for a period of ten (10) days after the day such written  
2 approval of such confinement and isolation by the animal control officer, is guilty of an  
3 infraction. Any such animal, whether licensed or unlicensed, not continuously confined and  
isolated as required shall be taken up forthwith by the animal control officer and isolated as  
provided in Subsection E of this Section 6.04.040.

4 K. No person shall bring an animal or permit an animal to enter the city in which  
5 rabies exists, or has existed within the previous six (6) months unless the animal has been  
6 vaccinated with anti-rabies vaccine, and the owner of the animal has an official tag or other  
receipt showing that the animal has been vaccinated by a duly licensed veterinarian.

7 **6.04.050 - Redeeming Impounded Animals.**

8 A. The animal control officer upon the impounding of any animal, shall notify the  
9 owner, if known, in accordance with the provisions of Subsection F. of this Section 6.04.050, or  
10 if unknown by posting a notice of impound containing a description of the animal and the time  
and place of apprehension for five (5) days on the city website. After the expiration of this  
11 period, any unredeemed animal may be disposed of as provided for in subsection G of this  
Section 6.04.050.

12 B. Except as otherwise provided in Section 6.04.040, 6.04.117, 6.04.118, the owner  
of any animal impounded in accordance with the provisions of this chapter may at any time  
13 before the disposition of the animal redeem the animal. Upon proof satisfactory to the animal  
control officer that such person is the owner and is entitled to redeem such animal and upon  
14 payment of the redemption and maintenance charges as established by city council resolution  
and upon obtaining a city dog license, if the dog is unlicensed and required to have such  
15 license, such animal may be redeemed by such person. The animal control officer shall issue a  
redemption receipt to the person redeeming the animal. The redemption receipt shall identify  
16 the amount of fees paid by the person redeeming the animal and contain a description of the  
animal redeemed, the date of redemption and the name and address of the person redeeming  
17 the animal.

18 C. Redemption fees and maintenance charges shall be set by city council resolution  
19 and based upon the number of times an animal is impounded, as follows:

- 20 1. First time within six months: Basic redemption fee.  
21 2. Second time within six months: Double the basic redemption fee.  
22 3. Third time within six months: Triple the basic redemption fee.  
23 4. Each time after the third time within six (6) months: One Thousand  
24 Dollars (\$1,000.00).

25 D. The city is authorized at its discretion to hold for a period of ten (10) days any  
impounded dog in heat prior to redemption or disposal.

26 E. If any unlicensed animal or any dog bearing no license tag, is impounded under  
27 the provisions of this chapter and is not redeemed within ten (10) days after the date the animal  
is impounded, the animal control officer may at any time thereafter dispose of the animal as  
provided in subsection G of this Section 6.04.050.

1 F. If a dog licensed in accordance with the provisions of this chapter is impounded  
2 under the provisions of this chapter, the dog shall not be disposed of until after written notice  
3 has been given by the animal control officer to the owner of said dog at the address set forth in  
4 the city licensing records. The notice shall contain a description of the dog impounded, the  
5 breed, sex, the date the dog was impounded and identifying the amount necessary to redeem  
6 the dog. The notice shall be served by mailing by United States mail to the owner of the dog at  
7 the last address of the owner as shown on the city's licensing records. If no person appears and  
8 redeems the dog within ten (10) days after the date of mailing of the notice or within ten (10)  
9 days after the dog was impounded, whichever is later, the animal control officer shall cause the  
10 dog to be disposed of as provided in subsection G of this Section 6.04.050.

11 G. If the animal impounded is not redeemed within the redemption period or if the  
12 owner fails or refuses to comply with any of the requirements of redemption, the animal control  
13 officer shall dispose of the animal according to the provisions of this Subsection G. In disposing  
14 of an impounded animal, the animal control officer may, in his/her discretion: 1) release the  
15 animal to an animal adoption organization; 2) release the animal to an animal rescue  
16 organization; or 3) euthanize the animal in a humane manner and as provided by applicable  
17 law.

18 H. All animals impounded by the animal control officer shall be kept at the risk of  
19 the owner, and neither the city nor its officials, officers, agents or employees shall be liable to  
20 the owner for the delivery in good faith of any such animal to a person claiming to be, but not in  
21 fact being, entitled to reclaim the animal. Neither the city nor its officials, officers, agents or  
22 employees shall be liable for injury or disease to any animal incurred while the animal is being  
23 captured, transported, impounded, or liable for the disposition of any animal.

#### 24 **6.04.060 - Duties of Animal Control Officer.**

25 A. The duties of the Animal Control Officer shall be as follows:

26 1. To take up and impound any dog or other animal as required by this  
27 chapter, including, without limitation, dogs or other animals found to be running at large, staked  
or tied or in any public place within the city or upon the premises of any person other than the  
owner of such animal or as otherwise required by this chapter.

2. To make a complete registry of impounded animals, identifying as to  
each animal, the date of receipt, the breed, color, and sex of such animal, and if licensed, the  
number of such license and the name and address of the owners, if any, the date and manner  
of disposal and such additional records as may be required by the city from time to time.

3. To operate and maintain the pound.

#### 28 **6.04.070 - Authority of Animal Control Officer.**

29 A. Each animal control officer shall have, and is hereby vested with the authority in  
30 the performance of their duties, to enter upon any property pursuant to law, to ascertain if any  
31 of the provisions of this chapter or any laws, regulations or ordinances including, without  
32 limitation, the provisions of this chapter or any law, regulations or ordinances relating to  
33 disease, care, treatment, or cruelty to animals is being violated. Each animal control officer may  
34 issue citations for the violation of the provisions of this chapter, any law, regulation or ordinance

1 in the manner prescribed by said law, regulation or ordinance, and remove animals from said  
2 premises as the animal control officer deems necessary. The authority to issue citations in the  
manner prescribed by the city shall be in addition to any other authority provided by law.

3 B. In the performance of duties for the control of animals, the animal control officer  
4 shall have the authority to employ the use of the tranquilizer gun or other animal control devices  
in common use within the State of California.

5 C. In addition to other authority provided by law for making arrests, the animal  
6 control officer is authorized to make arrests according to California Penal Code Section 836.5  
for the purpose of enforcing and carrying out provisions of this chapter.

7 D. Every person who willfully resists, delays, or obstructs the animal control officer  
8 in the discharge of or attempt to discharge, any duty of his/her office is guilty of a misdemeanor.

9 E. For the purpose of enforcing or discharging the duties of the animal control  
10 officer, imposed by this chapter, Health and Safety Code Section 121625, Government Code  
11 Section 53074, or other applicable laws, the animal control officer or any police officer may  
enter upon private property, except dwellings, as follows:

12 (a) When in pursuit of any animal which the officer has reasonable or  
probable cause to believe is subject to impoundment.

13 (b) To impound or place in isolation or quarantine any animal which the  
14 officer has any cause whatsoever to believe or suspect has rabies, is a biting animal, is a  
potentially dangerous or vicious dog.

15 (c) To inspect or examine animals isolated on the property.

16 F. Except when time does not permit, such as in an emergency or when in fresh  
17 pursuit, before entering upon private property reasonable effort shall be made to locate the  
18 property owner or possessor to request permission to enter upon the property and to explain  
the purpose for entry.

19 **6.04.080 - Animal Care.**

20 It shall be unlawful for the owners or persons having custody of any animal to permit,  
21 either willfully or through failure to exercise due care or control, any cruel acts upon any animal.  
"Cruel acts" are defined as follows:

22 A. To place, leave or expose, making accessible to animals, any poisonous  
23 substance.

24 B. To have, keep, or harbor any animal which is infected with any dangerous or  
25 incurable or painfully crippling condition. This Section shall not apply to animals within  
26 veterinary hospitals or under the care of a veterinarian, or having been diagnosed with any  
27 common, incurable disease where impoundment or quarantine is not recommended by a doctor  
of veterinary medicine.

1 C. To fail, refuse, or neglect to provide any animal in their charge or custody as  
2 owner or otherwise, with food, drink, shade or weatherproof housing facilities, or to carry any  
3 animal in or upon any vehicle in a cruel or inhumane manner.

4 D. To willfully, or maliciously kill, maim, disfigure, tease, torture, beat with a stick,  
5 chain, club, or other object, mutilate, burn, scald with any substance, overdrive or other cruelty  
6 set upon any animal, except that a reasonable force may be employed to drive off vicious or  
7 trespassing animals.

8 E. To promote, stage, hold, manage, conduct, carry on, or attend any game,  
9 exhibition, contest, or fight in which one or more animals are engaged for the purpose of  
10 injuring, killing, maiming, or destroying themselves or any other animal or person.

11 F. No person shall keep upon any premises, any animals in a foul, offensive,  
12 obnoxious, filthy or unsanitary condition.

13 **6.04.090 - Limits on the Number of Dogs.**

14 No person shall keep, harbor or maintain upon the person's premises within the city  
15 more than a total of five (5) dogs over the age of four (4) months of age, unless a person who  
16 had, on or before the effective date chapter, six (6) or more licensed dogs in the city, in which  
17 event, such person can retain but not replace the dogs in excess of five (5) dogs.

18 **6.04.110 - Excessive Noise, Nuisance.**

19 It shall be unlawful for any dog to be kept in the city, which, in a loud manner,  
20 excessively barks, howls, whines or makes any other noises which disturb the comfort or quiet  
21 enjoyment of any neighborhood or any person; provided the owner of the dog has been made  
22 aware of the disturbance created by the dog by the animal control officer. Such loud and  
23 excessive noises shall constitute a public nuisance.

24 **6.04.111 - At Large, Prohibited.**

25 It shall be unlawful for any person having the care or possession of a dog or any other  
26 animal to allow or permit the dog or other animal to run at large within the city. Except that,  
27 subject to the rules and regulations issued by the city regarding the use of the city dog park, an  
owner of a dog or any person having custody or control of a dog, may allow the dog to go upon  
and run at large within that portion of the city identified as the Laurel Street Ponding Basin  
which is specifically designated by the city as a dog park area.

**6.04.112 - Animal Bites.**

Whenever it is shown that any animal has bitten any person, the owner of the animal  
shall, upon the order of the animal control officer, quarantine the animal and keep it tied up and  
confined for a period of ten (10) days, and shall allow the animal control or other authorized  
official to make an examination of the animal at any time during the period of quarantine.

**6.04.113 - Prohibited Animals.**

No animal, whether domesticated, undomesticated or exotic, other than common  
household pets such as a dog, cat, bird (domestic or exotic), rodent (including a rabbit), fish

1 (domestic or exotic), turtle or small reptile traditionally kept at a personal residence for pleasure  
2 rather than for commercial purposes, shall be kept within the city limits of the city unless  
3 specifically allowed to be kept in the city limits of the city by the applicable provisions of the  
4 Kingsburg Municipal Code. As used herein, domesticated animal means livestock, poultry and  
5 similar animals. Exotic animal means any animal that is native to a foreign country or of foreign  
6 origin or character, is not native to the United States, or was introduced from abroad. The  
7 provisions of this Section 6.04.118 A. shall not include animals that are used to assist persons  
8 with disabilities as the term disability is defined in the Americans With Disabilities Act.  
9

6 **6.04.114 - Breeder Permit.**

7 A. It shall be unlawful for any person to breed two (2) or more litters of dogs or cats  
8 in one calendar year without first obtaining a breeder permit. A person seeking a Breeder  
9 Permit must complete a Breeder Permit application in the form established by the city. The fees  
10 for a breeder permit shall be set by resolution of the city council and must be submitted to the  
11 city clerk along with the Breeder Permit application.

10 B. Breeding permit requirements are as follows:

11 1. No offspring can be sold/adopted until the offspring is between six to  
12 eight (6-8) weeks of age;

13 2. No offspring can be sold/adopted until vaccinated against common  
14 diseases;

14 3. The breeder permit holder must display the Breeder Permit number when  
15 advertising the animals for sale or adoption.

16 C. It shall be unlawful for any breeder to advertise for the sale or adoption of a litter  
17 of dogs or cats in the city without including in the advertisement a city Breeder Permit number.

18 **6.04.115 - Prohibition of Potentially Dangerous or Vicious Dog.**

19 It shall be unlawful for a person to own, keep or harbor a potentially dangerous or  
20 vicious dog. Any dog which has been found to be potentially dangerous or vicious pursuant to  
21 the chapter, any county or ordinance or any state statute, shall be conclusively presumed to be  
22 potentially dangerous or vicious.

22 **6.04.116 - Procedure to Determine if a Dog is Dangerous or Vicious.**

23 A. The animal control officer shall determine whether a dog is potentially dangerous  
24 or vicious whenever it has attacked, bitten or caused injury to any human or other animal.  
25 Within five (5) days after a dog which is wearing a license tag is impounded pursuant to this  
26 chapter, a animal control officer shall mail a written notice to the person identified as the as the  
27 dog as identified in the city licensing documents for the dog, of the animal control officer's  
determination that the dog is potentially dangerous or vicious and of the owner's right to a  
hearing on the issue of whether the dog is potentially dangerous or vicious. The Hearing Officer  
shall be the Chief of Police or his designee. If the dog is not wearing a license tag the animal  
control officer shall make a reasonable effort to locate the owner of the unlicensed dog. If the  
animal control officer does not locate the owner of the unlicensed dog, the animal control officer  
shall dispose of the dog in accordance with the provisions of Section 6.04.119 C of this chapter.

1 B. The owner of a dog impounded pursuant to this Section may, within ten (10)  
2 days after the date of the written notice from the animal control officer request a hearing on  
3 whether the dog is potentially dangerous or vicious by providing the animal control officer with a  
4 written request for a hearing within said ten (10) day period. Failure of the owner to request, in  
5 writing, a hearing within said ten (10) day period, shall constitute the owner's waiver of the  
6 hearing and the determination by the animal control officer that the dog is potentially dangerous  
7 or vicious shall be binding on the owner of the dog.

8 C. If an owner properly requests a hearing, the animal control officer shall retain the  
9 services of a veterinarian or other person licensed to perform a behavioral study of the dog to  
10 determine whether the dog can be rehabilitated or retrained to eliminate the dangerous and  
11 vicious character of the dog. If the Hearing Officer finds the dog to be potentially dangerous or  
12 vicious, the owner of the dog shall reimburse the city the cost of the behavioral study.

13 D. When a hearing is requested pursuant to subsection B of this Section, the  
14 animal control officer shall set a date and time for such a hearing and send a notice thereof by  
15 regular mail at least ten (10) days, before the hearing date to the owner at the address set forth  
16 on his or her request and shall also notify the victim and the Hearing Officer.

#### 17 **6.04.117 - Conduct of Hearing.**

18 A. A hearing requested in accordance with subsection 6.04.116 B of this chapter  
19 shall be conducted before the Hearing Officer.

20 B. The hearing shall be open to the public. The owner may be represented by legal  
21 counsel. The Hearing Officer shall hear all pertinent evidence offered by all interested persons.  
22 The technical rules of evidence shall not be applicable to the hearing, except that the Hearing  
23 Officer's decision may not be based wholly on hearsay evidence. Each side shall have the right  
24 to call and examine witnesses; to introduce exhibits; to cross-examine opposing witnesses on  
25 any matter relevant to the issues at the hearing even though the matter was not covered in the  
26 direct examination; and to rebut the evidence against him or her.

27 C. If the owner does not testify on his or her behalf, he or she may be called and  
examined as if under cross-examination, except where criminal charges under Sections  
6.04.121 and 6.04.122 of this chapter are pending against the owner or if it is possible that such  
charges may be brought against the owner. All persons giving evidence shall be sworn before  
testifying. The owner may employ a shorthand reporter to record the hearing.

D. Any dog which has attacked, bitten or caused injury to a human being or other  
animal is presumed to be potentially dangerous or vicious and the burden is on the owner to  
present evidence that the dog is not potentially dangerous or vicious.

E. In making a determination that a dog is or is not potentially dangerous or vicious,  
evidence of the following shall be considered:

1. Any previous history of the dog attacking, biting or causing injury to a  
human being or other animal;

2. The nature and extent of injuries inflicted and the number of victims  
involved;

- 1
- 2 3. The place where the bite, attack or injury occurred;
- 3 4. The presence or absence of any provocation for the bite, attack or injury;
- 4 5. The extent to which property has been damaged or destroyed;
- 5 6. Whether the dog exhibits any characteristics of being trained for fighting  
6 or attack or other evidence to show such training or fighting;
- 7 7. Whether the dog exhibits characteristics or aggressive or unpredictable  
7 temperament or behavior in the presence of human beings, other dogs or other animals;
- 8 8. Whether the dog can be effectively trained to change its temperament or  
9 behavior;
- 10 9. The manner in which the dog has been maintained by its owner;
- 11 10. The results of the behavioral study of the dog;
- 12 11. Any other relevant evidence concerning the characteristics or  
13 maintenance of the dog; and
- 14 12. Any other relevant evidence regarding the ability of the owner to protect  
14 the public safety in the future if the dog is permitted to remain in the city.

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16 **6.04.118 - Hearing Decision.**

17 A. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Hearing Officer may determine:

- 18 1. That the dog is not a potentially dangerous or vicious dog and should be  
18 returned to its owner;
- 19 2. That the dog is not potentially dangerous or vicious, but the attack, bite or  
20 injury was the result of improper or negligent training, handling or maintenance and that the  
21 license should be revoked and proper training of the owner and the dog be required pursuant to  
21 Section 6.04.122 of this chapter.
- 22 3. That the dog is a potentially dangerous or vicious dog and it should be  
23 disposed of in accordance with Section 6.04.119 C, no sooner than thirty (30) days following  
23 the date or mailing of written notice of the Hearing Officer's decision, pursuant to this Section.

24 B. The decision of the Hearing Officer shall be in writing and shall be delivered  
25 personally to the owner or mailed to the owner by regular mailing at the address appearing on  
25 the request for hearing. A copy of the decision shall be mailed to the animal control officer.

26 C. The owner may seek judicial review of a decision of the Hearing Officer made  
27 after a hearing pursuant to section 1094.6 of the California Code of Civil Procedure where and  
27 to the extent said section may be applicable.

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**6.04.119 - Disposition of a Potentially Dangerous or Vicious Dog.**

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, possess, harbor or keep any dog declared to be potentially dangerous or vicious pursuant to this chapter.

B. Any dog declared to be potentially dangerous or vicious, if not already impounded, shall be immediately surrendered to the animal control officer and it is the duty of the animal control officer to take up and impound any such animal.

C. Any dog declared to be potentially dangerous or vicious shall be humanely destroyed. The animal control officer shall sign an order authorizing the destruction of the animal thirty-one (31) days after the date of the mailing of the Hearing Officer's decision to the owner of the dog.

**6.04.120 - Procedure if Dog is Not Found Potentially Dangerous or Vicious.**

A. If it is determined that the dog is not potentially dangerous or vicious, but that the bite, attack or injury was the result of improper or negligent training, handling, maintenance or provocation, then the following conditions will be enforced:

1. Training will be required of the owner and the dog as determined by the Hearing Officer and monitored by the animal control officer.

2. The current license will be revoked and a "provisional" dog license will be issued during a training period.

3. After successful completion of the training of the dog, as determined by the animal control officer, the dog shall be issued a current city dog license and the owner will pay all license fees and penalties as may be required.

4. Any violation of the training terms set forth by the Hearing Officer will result in immediate impoundment. The dog will be declared to be potentially dangerous or vicious and humanely destroyed no sooner than ten (10) days after mailing a notice of violation of training and impoundment.

**6.04.121 - Penalties for Dog Bites and Attacks.**

A. In any case where a dog attacks a human being or another animal, such act shall constitute a separate and distinct violation, and shall be punishable as follows:

1. Any person whose dog attacks a human being without causing bodily injury, or attacks another animal, shall be guilty of an infraction and shall be punished upon a first conviction by a fine of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and for a second conviction within a period of twelve (12) months by a fine of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) and for a third or subsequent conviction within twelve (12) months, by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

2. Any person whose dog attacks a human being causing bodily injury shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or by imprisonment in the County jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

1 3. After each attack or bite, the animal control officer shall determine  
2 whether a dog is potentially dangerous or vicious pursuant to Section 6.04.118 of this chapter.

3 **6.04.122- Penalties Generally.**

4 A. Except as otherwise provided in Section 6.04.121 of this chapter, any person  
5 violating any provision of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of an infraction and shall be  
6 subject to the following fines:

7 One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) upon the first offense.

8 Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) upon the second offense in a twelve (12) month period.

9 Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) upon the third offense in a twelve (12) month period.

10 B. If any violation is continued, each day's violation shall be deemed a separate  
11 violation. Any person found guilty of more than three (3) violations of this chapter within a  
12 twelve (12) month period shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined up to one  
13 thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than six (6) months  
14 for each misdemeanor conviction. The person shall also pay any and all expenses, including  
15 shelter, food, veterinarian expenses for identification or certification or boarding associated with  
16 the seizure of their dog.

17 **6.04.123 - Protection of Police Canine Units.**

18 A. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully or maliciously torture, tease,  
19 torment, beat, kick, strike, mutilate, injure, disable or kill any dog used by the city of Kingsburg  
20 police department, or any other law enforcement agency while engaged in mutual aid  
21 assistance to this city, or the designated handlers of such animals, while any such dog is in the  
22 performance of the functions or duties of the police department or other law enforcement  
23 agency, or to willfully interfere with or obstruct any such dog while it is being used in the  
24 performance of any of the duties or functions of the department or other law enforcement  
25 agency.

26 B. No provision of this section shall be constructed to prohibit any act made  
27 unlawful by any general law of the state of California, but said section is intended to be  
supplemental thereto.

**6.04.124 - Public Events or Assemblies.**

The city council may, by resolution, prohibit dogs whether or not confined by leash, from  
attendance at any public event as that term is defined in Section 6.04.010 and any assembly as  
that term is defined in Section 12.16.010 of this code. The prohibition of dogs shall not apply to  
guide dogs and other service dogs to assist disabled persons attending the public event or  
assembly.

**6.04.125 - Mandatory Microchipping of Dogs and Cats.**

Any dogs and/or cats in the city shall be implanted with an identifying microchip. The  
owner is required to provide the microchip number to the city clerk and shall notify the city clerk  
and the national registry applicable to the implanted chip of any change of ownership of the dog

1 or cat or any change in the owner's contact information. Upon redemption of a dog from the  
2 pound, the owner shall comply with this section and have the dog implanted with a microchip  
and provide microchip number to the city clerk.
