## Roundabout Bid Acceptance and Project Update

Sponsor: Engineering Department

City Engineer Dave Peters presented the plan for the Sierra Bethel Roundabout, big trucks will not have any issues. Grant will fund \$976,625. The base bid is \$971,946 with an add alternate is \$75,000 for landscaping and a breakaway coffee pot. Council Member Roman asked about painting the coffee pot to match the water tower. City Engineer Peters said yes, we still have the stencils. Council Member Roman wanted to make sure that it is noted that this has been discussed with packing houses and trucking companies.

City Engineer Dave Peters said traffic will continue to go through during construction. The timeline is June 2022 to August 2022. The construction company is trying to have it completed by the start of school. Mayor Pro Tem Palomar asked about the size of the coffee pot. City Engineer Peters said it will be 20 feet tall. Council Member Pursell, Jr. said the city is growing and we need roadway infrastructure improvements. The City will have to update it in the future, this way we can use grant money. City Engineer Dave Peters said the reason for the grant was that there were a lot of accidents when it had a two way stop. Now it is a 4 way stop and traffic is getting backed up, this will make the intersection efficient and safe.

Council Member Pursell, Jr. motioned, seconded by Council Member Hurtado, to award the Bethel & Sierra Roundabout project to Don Berry Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$1,046,946.00, which includes the base bid plus the additive alternat. The motion carried by unanimous voice vote of those Council Members present.

**2022-2023 City Manager's Recommended Budget Introduction -** Staff Report by City Manager Alexander Henderson.

Sponsor: City Manager's Office

City Manager Alexander Henderson reviewed this current year budget. He said we had passed a skinny budget due to covid and the financial unknowns. The revenues are outpacing the expenditures by \$800,000. The surplus will be moved to the waterfall fund as directed in the City's policy. Council Member Pursell, Jr. asked if we have a timeline for ARPA funds. City Manager Henderson said not yet.

City Manager Henderson reviewed the General Fund revenue forecast- sales tax will outpace property tax for the first time since he has been at the City. The General Fund expenditures include the new accountant positions. The solid waste fund is in the negative, staff is working on the Prop 218 election to raise rates to cover the cost. Council and staff discussed the water fund and that the turf replacement program will continue. He reviewed the CIP projects and CalPERS. The waterfall fund will have over \$3,000,000 projected by the end of Fiscal Year 2022-2023. All funds budget is at \$33 million. The presented budget is fiscally responsible and structurally balanced. Mayor Pro Tem Palomar asked about the Civic Rec software, as of right now you have to come in to rent the park or pay for recreation? City Manager Henderson said yes. This software will assist with reservation and payments. We are applying for a grant

to help pay for the startup costs since it will cut back on emissions from people having to drive to City Hall. City Council said good job.

## **Council Reports and Staff Communications**

**Community Services Commission-** City Manager Henderson reported they met last week, brief updates with Prop 68 grant.

Public Safety Committee- Mayor Pro Tem Palomar said they have not met.

**Chamber of Commerce** – Council Member Pursell, Jr. said they have not met.

**Economic Development**- Council Member Roman said they met last week.

**Finance Committee**- City Manager Henderson said they have not met.

**Planning Commission**- City Manager Henderson said they met regarding housing units.

South Kings Groundwater Sustainability Agency Joint Powers Authority (SKGSA)- Council Member Hurtado said nothing to report.

**Downtown Business Improvement District**- Council Member Hurtado said the BID discussed website and photos, success of the Swedish festivals.

**Council of Governments**- Council Member Roman said they discussed Measure C.

Council Member Reports- Council Member Hurtado commented that she had a great time at the Swedish Festival and the City Awards Ceremony. Council Member Roman spoke about the ribbon cutting at Linnaea Villas, it is a beautiful facility. She is impressed with the Fresno Housing Authority's quality of the projects. She spoke about free zoo tickets that will be given out in Fresno County with FCRTA proving rides. Council Member Pursell, Jr. enjoyed the Swedish Festival. He said it was nice to hear that senior residents from Kingsburg were able to move to Linnaea Villas to be able to stay in town. Council Member Roman thanked the Chamber of Commerce, Lions, and city staff for a successful Swedish festival. Mayor Pro Tem Palomar thanked Rotary for honoring his dad for his 40th consecutive Dala Horse Trot. He said Linnaea Villas is really nice.

City Manager's Report -City Manager Henderson spoke about the State Water Board Emergency Conservation Regulation. We are handing out citations, no more warning. Council Member Roman asked how do you want people to report overwatering. City Manager Henderson said it is best to go to the City's website and enter it in the request tracker. Council Member Roman asked who is in charge of monitoring over watering. City Manager Henderson said it is water department. Fire is doing weed abatement. Having a specific location is important when reporting over watering. Wells may have to be metered in the future. The street projects and the Madsen trail will being next week.
